County contests are open to all 4-H youth who are enrolled in at least one chartered club.



4-H Cooking Challenge

FCS | 3rd-12th Grade | 1-2 hours | Free | April



A team of two members or an individual contestant will prepare and complete a dish highlighting the challenge ingredient. The dish must be completed and presented to the judges within a 40-minute timeframe, including clean-up. The contestant will provide all equipment and ingredients. Contestants can prepare an appetizer, main course, or dessert.

Once their dish is ready, contestants will have up to 3 minutes to describe the presented dish, tell how they highlighted the challenge ingredient, and share some facts/knowledge about it.

Youth can compete individually or as a team of two, and registration is on ZSuite.

Challenge Ingredient:

2021-2022: Eat Beef (or protein substitute)

2022-2023: Very Berry 2023-2024: Zucchini

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Consumer Decision Making

FCS | 3rd-12th Grade | 2-4 hours | Free | March



Consumer Decision Making is a competitive team event that teaches youth financial management, how to be savvy consumers, and decision-making skills. Youth compete in teams of three to four. Team members are given a scenario in a class of items, such as bicycles, sunscreen, or backpacks, and a set of criteria to determine which item will best meet their needs. Each team member will work individually to rank the items of six different classes and give their verbal reasoning to judges on two of the classes. Team members' scores are combined, with the lowest score dropped for each class of a four-member team.

FCS Bowl

FCS | 3rd-12th | 6-8 Hours | Free | April



FCS Bowl is a knowledge bowl team competition that tests youth's knowledge of all aspects of Family Consumer Science. Teams of four youth compete in this "quiz show" style competition. In the first portion of the game, youth take turns to answer questions, buzzing in against the opposite team. In the second portion, any youth from the team can buzz in to respond to the question. In addition to the quiz bowl, youth take a knowledge test to determine the order of play. Youth can create a team or contact the FCS coordinator to join the county team.

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FCS Presentation/Demonstration

FCS | 3rd-12th | 2 hours + prep time | Free | January



The FCS presentation is a contest for individuals to present on any topic about home economics or family consumer science, except for cooking with a recipe. Favorite Foods is a contest entirely dedicated to presentations on cooking with a recipe.

Examples of topics include sewing a pencil case, designing a flower bed, or building a wooden trunk. Presentations are given on the completed project and describe the process. At the county level, presentations must be between 10 and 15 minutes for the Senior division, 7-10 for Intermediate, and 5-10 for Junior.

FCS Skill-A-Thon

FCS | 3rd-12th Grade | 2 hours + team practice/studying | Free | March



This team contest covers skills and knowledge gained by participating in all aspects of the Family Consumer Science project. The first part identifies three areas: clothing and sewing, foods and cooking, interior design, and home repairs. For this portion of the contest, team members work independently to identify various items from each category. Next, contestants judge a food class similar to the consumer decision-making contest, ranking the options provided and giving reasons for their ranking. Finally, the team is given a scenario based on a life skill. They are given time to prepare then present their solution to the judges.

The Skill-A-Thon is a team event, with four youth per team. Registration will be on ZSuite.

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Fashion Review

FCS | 3rd-12th Grade | 2 hours + prep time | Free | June



Fashion Review is divided into two categories: constructed and purchased/modified clothing. Contestants in both categories model their clothing and are interviewed by the judges. They should be prepared to describe the work they did on their clothing, share information about their experience working on this project, and answer other questions about the project. Youth entering a purchased/modified project will be scored 100% on their modeling and interview. Youth who enter a constructed item will be judged 50% on their modeling and interview and 50% on sewing construction. Contestants should be prepared for judges to examine their project following the interview.



Favorite Foods





Favorite Foods contestants will be judged on their selection, knowledge, and presentation of their favorite food. Contests must arrive at the event with all food prepared to serve. They should also provide a place setting and be prepared to offer samples of their favorite food to the judges. Contestants should be ready to answer the following questions:

- Why is it your favorite?
- Where did you get the recipe?
- Were there any special techniques used while preparing it?
- What else would you like to share about your favorite food?

Youth may enter as individuals or as a team of two. Registration is on ZSuite.

General & Horse Demonstration



General/Horse | 3rd-12th Graders | 5 hours prep, 2 hours at contest | Free | January

General: Giving a 4-H project demonstration can be fun! They are a show and tell about a fact, idea, or process. Demonstrations are a presentation on the process of a completed project. At the county level, presentations must be between 10 and 15 minutes for the senior division, 7-10 for the intermediate, and 5-10 for the junior. Youth select the topic of their choice to demonstrate and can include:

- Animals
- Plants
- STEM
- Citizenship and civic education
- Communication and expressive arts
- Environmental education
- Health
- Personal safety
- Personal development

Horse: Demonstration or illustrated talk of skills or methods of the horse industry and showcases the contestant's knowledge of the equine industry. Presentations should be 9-12 minutes in length for the senior division, 6–9 minutes for intermediate division, and at least 5 minutes for the junior division. Contestants may compete as a team of two or as an individual. Creative audio/visual aids are encouraged to help convey the significant points of the presentation, but the contestant must be involved in the creation of them. Visual aids may include, but are not limited to: handouts, posters, props, videos, slides, and computer-generated media. No live animals may be used.



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Discovery Days





4-H Discovery Days is the culminating event for Salt Lake County 4-H youth projects. Youth enter projects in the Indoor Exhibits, where they are judged and awarded ribbons. For youth in grades 3-12, judges will also select entries to advance to the State Fair. 4-H Discovery Days is held at Wheeler Historic Farm and offers hands-on activities, family games, and other activities in addition to the Indoor Exhibits. 4-H Discovery Days is held in place of the traditional County Fair, which Salt Lake County no longer offers.

Youth must be enrolled in a chartered 4-H club by July 1st to compete, and projects are submitted by club leaders in mid-August. All submitted entries are displayed for exhibit during Discovery Days.

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Impromptu Speaking

General/Leadership | 3rd-12th Grade | 2 hours | Free | November



Contestants will select a topic for their speech by randomly drawing three questions from a pool of questions. They have one minute to choose one question and return the other two. Questions will be relevant to today's youth and may include current events, 4-H, social issues, quotes, etc. Contestants may not use costumes, posters, visual aids, or props for their presentations. After selecting a topic, they are given an index card and pencil with three minutes to organize their thoughts and prepare their speech. Each must be between 3-5 minutes in duration. Points are deducted for every 30 seconds over or under the time limit.

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Portfolios

General/Leadership | 3rd-12th Grade | 2-5 hours | Free | September



4-H portfolios are a combination of a resume and cover letter to summarize the 4-H member's background, skills, and accomplishments. Portfolios are updated each year and only include the most pertinent information. The resume, once initially completed, will only need minor edits and updates throughout the year. However, the cover letter objectives can change depending on the purpose of the portfolio. Portfolios entered into the county contest can also be used throughout the year to apply for ambassadorships, state and regional leadership roles, and various animal projects/shows.

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Public Speaking

General & Horse | 3rd-12th Grade | 2-8 Hours Prep | Free | January



General: Contestants give a 6-8 minute prepared speech. The topic is not required to be 4-H related but must be relevant to today's youth. Contestants are judged on appearance, language effectiveness, pronunciation and enunciation, organization of contents, and overall quality of speech.

Horse: An original talk on any appropriate topic related to the horse industry; no visual aids may be used. Speeches should be 7-10 minutes in length for the senior division, 6 - 8 minutes for intermediates, and a minimum of 5 minutes for juniors.

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Horse Classics

Outdoor/Animal | 3rd-12th Grade | Time varies | County contest(s) are free; the state contest (4-H Classics) has a fee.



'Horse Classics' includes all the contests that horse-loving youth can compete in outside the arena. Specifics for each of these contests are outlined in this document. Some are team contests, and some are individual; you do not need to have access to a horse to participate in these contests because they are meant to demonstrate and test your knowledge of the equine industry.

These contests include:

Hippology Horse Bowl Horse Demonstrations Horse Judging Horse Public Speaking

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Horse Shows (Western)

Outdoor/Animal | 3rd-12th Grade | 100+ hours | Cost varies | April-Sept



The Utah 4-H Western Horse Program teaches youth to work with a project horse and test their equine knowledge throughout the year. Youth can show their horses in multiple western disciplines, including western horsemanship, showmanship at halter, western rail work, trail, ranch riding, reining, and bareback rail work. The shows offer three-speed events and include barrel racing, pole bending, keyhole, gymkhana, scurry, and quadrangle.

For the 2021-2022 4-H year, the events are: test, showmanship, western rail work, bareback rail work, barrels, pole bending, and scurry. Youth training horses five or younger can participate in the 2-Handed project and those training horses three years old to yearlings who have not been started under saddle can participate in the In-Hand project. Both projects include specific events that differ from the western individual project. We hope to add English and Working Ranch Horse shows soon. In the meantime, there are open state-wide shows for those interested in those disciplines.

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Jr. Livestock Show



Outdoor/Animal | 3rd-12th Grade | 100+ hours | Free | August

The 4-H Jr. livestock program's purpose is to provide experiences to develop a youth's life skills and learn about the science of livestock selection, care, and management. The exhibitor must own or possess, feed, and care for their project animal(s) for no less than 100 consecutive days for market beef and 60 consecutive days for market swine, sheep, and goats before the show; no interruption of ownership can occur. There are market, showmanship, and breeding classes for the different species the youth can enter with their animal. An auction is held for youth and their livestock at the show's end.

Because this is a partnered contest with the SLCo Jr. Livestock board registration is unavailable on ZSuite and is held on an independent website. Additionally, all animals must be tagged and follow all rules and deadlines per the Utah Junior Livestock Association (UJLA).

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Shooting Sports





SLCo 4-H has a community shooting sports club you can join in ZSuite, Str8Shooters. Disciplines included in the club are archery, .22 rifle, and shotgun. Each discipline has individual sections to learn how to use them in different scenarios. Youth learn about outdoor recreation, firearm safety, wildlife identification, and shooting skills and techniques.

The contest includes a knowledge test with two parts: multiple choice and animal identification, and various skills portions within each discipline. The book used for the test is "Today's Hunter-Utah." Youth will compete as individuals, and they can choose which disciplines they'd like to participate in.

- Archery is divided into 3D shoot, field shoot, and Fita shoot.
- .22 rifle is divided into NRA 3 position, NRA small-bore silhouette, and CMP sporter
- Shotgun is divided by trap, skeet, and 5 stand shooting.

Youth must provide their own firearm/bow, equipment, and ammo/arrows. Youth must have completed the Hunter Education Course and have their certificate before participating in club meetings or contests.

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Small Animal & Pet Advocate Pet Show

Outdoor/Animal | 3rd-12th Grade | 1-4 hours prep | Free | August



The 4-H Pet Show enables youth passionate about companion animals to showcase their skills and knowledge about pet care and show off their pets to an audience. The Pet Show is an opportunity to present a specific pet-care skill and talk with the public about their companion animal. Live animals are not required for participation. A plush or toy animal is appropriate and will not be penalized. Exhibitors may enter one pet per class but must have a new poster/display per class. Classes include

B. Cats

- Healthy living
- STEM

State Contests



State contests require youth to be enrolled in at least one chartered club. Most state contests also require youth to compete at the county level to qualify for state. State contests are held all over the state and gives an opportunity to meet other 4-H'ers outside of SLCo.



4-H Classic

General | 3rd-12th Grade | Varies | Approx \$120 | June



This state event encompasses 4-H's classic contests, including FCS, Speech, Design Challenge, Agriscience, and Horse & Livestock. Youth must compete in the correlating county contest and earn a blue ribbon to attend and compete in this event. Senior aged youth (9-12th grades) can qualify for the Western National Roundup, the national contest that takes place in Denver, Colorado.

In addition to the State Contests, 4-H Classic will offer workshops and classes on various topics. 4-H youth will select courses to attend when not competing. Workshops for adult leaders are also available.

These contests will be offered at 4-H Classic but do not have a national contest: Design Challenge, General Demonstration, 4-H Cooking Challenge, Favorite Foods.*

Registration will be on ZSuite.

Participants will be responsible for their lodging.

Outdoor/Animal | 9th-12th Grade | 25+ hours | Enrollment Cost: TBD | April



This Utah Natural Resources Competition & Event is held annually and serves as the Utah State Qualifier for four national natural resources competitions. The team with the highest overall total represents Utah at the National Envirothon. The team with the highest overall total for the Forestry Station will represent Utah at the National Forestry Invitational. The team with the highest point total for the Wildlife Station will represent Utah at the National Wildlife Habitat Education Program Contest. The Utah Envirothon motivates students to develop the knowledge and skills necessary to address complex issues and challenges associated with management of natural resources while empowering them to be active and involved citizens.


This competition includes a "current issue presentation" and 5 test stations in the areas that include: Forestry, Aquatic Ecology, Wildlife, Soils/Land Use, and a current issue. Teams consist of four to five members and may include an alternate.

STEM | 3rd-12th Grade | 2-20 hours | Free | February

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Shooting Sports & Western Heritage



Shooting Sports

The Shooting Sports state contest is comprised of three disciplines: archery, .22 rifle, and shotgun. The contest includes a knowledge test and a skills portion. The knowledge test includes multiple-choice questions and animal identification. The skills portion is dependent on the discipline.

- Archery is divided into 3D shoot, field shoot, and Fita shoot.
- .22 rifle is divided into NRA 3 position, NRA small-bore silhouette, and CMP sporter
- Shotgun is divided by trap, skeet, and 5 stand shooting.

Youth will compete as individuals and depending on the year they may compete in any of the disciplines. However, sometimes they have to qualify for a discipline on the county level first before state.

Western Heritage:

This contest is a combination of 4-H shooting sports and a living history of the frontier west from 1860 to 1900. Youth dress in old west clothing, use period-style sidearms, rifles, and shotguns, and then shoot steel targets at various distances. The score is determined by the fastest time with time penalties for misses. Youth also participate in a period outfit evaluation and interview to showcase their character portrayal and historical knowledge.

*Youth must provide their own firearm/bow, equipment, and ammo/arrows. Youth must have completed the Hunter Education Course and have their certificate before participating.
*Senior aged youth (9-12th grades) can qualify for a national contest for both of these events at the state contest(s).

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State Dog & Pet Show





The Utah 4-H companion animal programs include the 4-H Pet Advocate Project and the Utah 4-H Dog Program. These programs are for youth interested in companion animals, including dogs, cats, miniature horses, rabbits, guinea pigs, mice, and more. Youth involved in companion animal projects will be provided with experience to help develop life skills, social skills, and animal husbandry. The 4-H Pet Advocate Program includes projects for youth who have their own pet and those who don't, but still want to learn about animal husbandry and care. The Utah 4-H Companion Animal Event is an opportunity for youth to showcase their companion animals and demonstrate their knowledge and skill with their pets! The Companion Animal Event includes the Pet Advocate and Veterinarian Science Contests, Pet Show/Demonstrations, and the State 4-H Dog Show.

*It is the individual's responsibility to have access (own or lease) to a dog to participate in the dog show.

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State Horse Show



Outdoor/Animal | 3-12th Grade | Spring-Early Fall | Registration cost TBD | September

The Utah 4-H State Horse Show is the pinnacle event for many of the youth involved in the horse project. For those in the Western Individual division, it is a pre-qualifying event where each county is given a number of individuals per age division they can send to the state show each year. Salt Lake County has a point system at the county shows used to determine the qualifying youth for each age division. The State Horse Show also has other divisions that are not pre-qualifying. Any youth interested in attending and is signed up and participating in their county program may compete. They are as follows: English Hunter Jumper Show, Working Ranch Horse Gathering, Western Two-Handed Show, and In-Hand Show. The Utah State Horse Show is held at various locations throughout the state but stays in one location for a two-year rotation.

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Utah State Fair

General | 3rd-12th Grade | Varies | Entry fee varies on project | September



Indoor Exhibits: Entries are selected from the 4-H Discovery Days Indoor Exhibits to qualify for the Utah State Fair. Most entries are stored and delivered to the State Fair by SLCo 4-H staff. Qualifying cooking and horticulture participants are given a date to bring fresh food items, flowers, and produce to the county office to enter the State Fair.

Junior Livestock Show: This program is for youth in grades 3rd-12th, but not younger than 8. These 4-H youth raise beef, goats, sheep, and hogs. Animals participating in these state shows must be tagged using the state tags by your local 4-H agent or FFA advisor. Animals must be tagged and owned 100 days before the weigh-in of a show for beef (market steers and market heifers) and 60 days for market sheep, goats, and hogs. No interruption of ownership or possession can occur. Entry form and fee must be submitted by dates published in the exhibitor handbook. There may be limits to the number of market and breeding animals youth can show.

Cloverbud Camp

General | K-2nd Grade | 3 hours | \$10 | March

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TRY Team Training
