Search Strategies

- Access library article databases (or other, see below) at: <u>https://library2.usu.edu/inabs/</u>
- Under agriculture and business/economics you can use search engines with key words to find articles. The best search engines are Agricola, Econ Lit, AgEcon Search, CAB direct, and Business Source Premier.
- Experiment with search terms until you have captured an advanced-search combination that returns only relevant results and without missing any, e.g.: ("cow calf" OR beef) AND ("e* coli" OR "gram negative").
- Once you have downloaded several articles, you can use the reference lists of the articles to find additional articles on the subject.
 - Save your searches and set search alerts to be notified of new scholarship.
 - Pay attention to the <u>sources that your sources cite</u> most often and read and cite them yourself.
- Compile a description of all articles in an excel file (or other organization method, see below)
- Place all article PDFs in a folder (such as Box, Dropbox, etc.)

Search Engines

- USU Library Database (to find a database by subject or special category) at: <u>https://library.usu.edu</u>
- <u>Scopus</u> ("comprehensive" searching of scholarly journals)
- <u>Google Scholar</u> ("comprehensive" searching of scholarly and semi-scholarly content)
- <u>ProQuest Dissertations and Theses</u> (exhaustive full-text access to US and international dissertations)

Organize and Synthesize Sources

- Use a citation manager to track, organize, and cite sources. <u>This guide</u> helps you choose one and links to some tutorials on the major software options as well as contact information for librarians who can help.
- Options include Endnote, Reference Manager, Zotero, etc.
