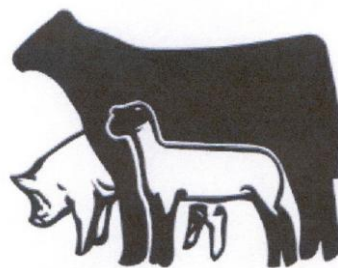

Cache County Junior Livestock Project - General Rules

1. **Age** – All exhibitors must be in the third grade, **and** not less than 8 years of age on October 1, of the current 4-H year. Exhibitors can participate through the summer following their senior year.
2. **Group Affiliation** – Exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H or FFA.
3. **Tagging/Weigh-in** – All market animals must be tagged on the designated dates.
4. **Brand Inspection** - Utah law requires a Brand Inspection Certificate for changes of ownership for cattle. If you purchase an animal, make sure the seller provides this certificate.
5. **Do Own Work** - Each exhibitor must do his/her own work in caring for, feeding, training, and fitting for show, as much as they are capable. Parents, guardians, siblings, club or project leaders, FFA Advisors and Extension/4-H Agents may assist exhibitors, but the exhibitor is primarily responsible for the project animal.
6. **Code of Ethics** – All exhibitors (and parents/guardians) must comply with the code of ethics that includes the following:
 - a. Inhumane fitting, showing, and/or handling practices are not acceptable
 - b. Treating animals with any substance to artificially alter the conformation or phenotypic appearance of the animal is illegal and will result in disqualification.
 - c. Use of illegal drugs on project animals is prohibited. Read and follow product labels when using any medication on your animal with care to observe withdrawal times.
 - d. **Tail Dock Rule Change** to conform with the State Junior Livestock Association rule: *The recommended method is to dock at the distal end on the caudal fold (3rd caudal vertebra). Complete tail removal (extreme docking) is not an accepted sheep production practice and is discouraged for all Utah Junior Livestock sheep projects. Market lambs or breeding sheep showing any signs of contagious disease or current or recent signs of prolapse, or with an open sore on the dock (rosebud), will be sifted from Utah Junior Livestock Shows at the discretion of the state show vet at the time of weigh in and their determination is final.*
 - e. Livestock Committee will review reports of violations and reserves the right to disqualify violators.
7. **Dress Code** – 4-H exhibitors must wear a predominately white, long or short sleeve shirt that fastens down the front with a collar and the 4-H patch; FFA – a white shirt, tie and FFA jacket, or a white shirt with the FFA emblem and tie. Violation of dress code will result in forfeiture of all prize money.
8. **Presentation of Animal** – Animals that are not clean, fitted and controllable by the exhibitor can be sifted from competition by ring officials and/or department chairpersons.
9. **Market Animal Weights** – Market animals must meet the minimum weight requirements to show and sale in the Market Livestock Sale. Swine must be under the maximum weight. Exhibitors of light or heavy animals are encouraged to participate in the showmanship contest.

Hogs	230 to 290 pounds
Lambs	100 to no maximum

10. **Multiple Animals** - Exhibitors may exhibit two animals of any combination, and sell only one animal. Exhibitor must notify department chairman, as to which animal they want to sell, immediately following the show. Marketing of additional animals is the responsibility of the exhibitor.
11. **Participation** – All youth exhibitors must personally show and sale their own project animals to be eligible to sell in the market sale, unless prior approval is obtained from Livestock Committee.
12. **Report Form** – All exhibitors must submit a current and completed project report form prior to release of payment for animals sold at the junior livestock sale. 4-H portfolio can be substituted for this record form.
13. **Floor animals** – Animals sent to the floor buyer, not through the auction are the responsibility of the exhibitor.

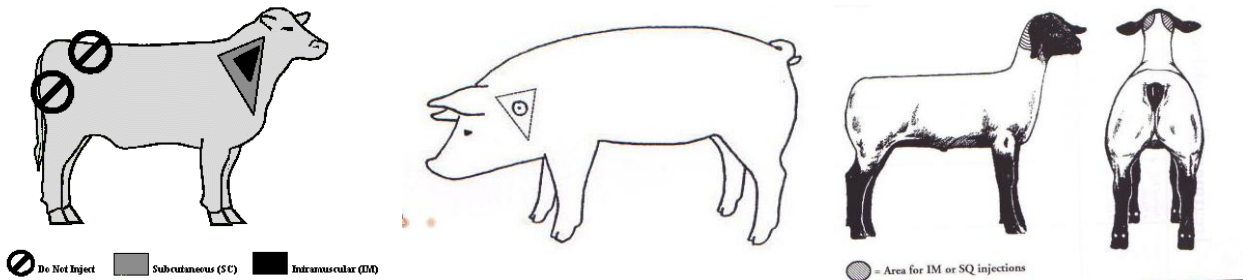

VACCINATION & MEDICATION RECORD

Read and follow vaccine and drug label instructions. Administer injections according to directions with care given to follow withdrawal times. Indicate on the animals above where injections were given and log the information on chart below. For example, your animal is given an injection for the treatment listed as number 1 in the chart, in the left side of his neck, indicate on the animal illustration with a number "1" to show where it was given and "L" for left or "R" for right side of the animal. **SQ** (subcutaneous), **IM** (intramuscularly), **IV** (intravenous), **O** (oral), and **MF** (medicated feed) are routes of administration. If you purchased your animal, include any information that person might have related to vaccinations or medicine used.
