What is 4-H?

As a part of the youth development program of Utah State University Cooperative Extension, 4-H is an informal, practice educational program for youth. In 4-H, we believe in the power of young people. We see that every child has valuable strengths and real influence to improve the world around us. Cooperative Extension, a community of more than 100 public universities, delivers 4-H programs across the nation. These programs provide experiences for young people to learn by doing. For more than 100 years, 4-H has welcomed young people of all beliefs and backgrounds, giving kids a voice to express who they are and how they make their lives and communities better.

Through life-changing 4-H programs, nearly six million kids have taken on critical societal issues, such as addressing community health inequities, engaging in civil discourse, and advocating for equity and inclusion for all. In 4-H, kids complete hands-on projects in health, science, agriculture, and civic engagement in a positive environment where they receive guidance from adult mentors and are encouraged to take on proactive leadership roles. 4-H opportunities are available in every county and parish in the country through in-school and after-school programs, school and community clubs, and 4-H camps.

Box Elder County averaged **565 youth contacts** per month.
Approximately **750 youth** are enrolled in Box Elder County 4-H.

Volunteer Responsibilities



CLUB VOLUNTEER

Purpose: to ensure positive youth development by assisting members in selecting and completing specific 4-H projects of interest. The club volunteer keeps the club functioning.

Specific Duties

- Relate project experiences to everyday life skills
- Host club meetings
- Recruit club members
- Assist in club voting in and organization of youth officers
- Recruit additional adult/older youth volunteers to assist in the project as needed
- Delegate to Project and Assistant leaders to assist members with project work, materials, and presentations
- Assist Project and Assistant leaders as needed
- Liaison with the 4-H Extension staff, members, parents, and other volunteers in carrying out the club's overall plans
- Attended necessary training and council meetings

Life Skills | Projects

This part of the meeting includes activities and experiences that help 4-H members develop life skills such as positive self-esteem, decision making, communication, leadership skills, and community and global awareness. Ideas can be found in the 4-H project books entitled; "Leadership Skills You Never Outgrow" (contact your Extension office for a copy). This is a good time to work on community service projects.

Project clubs may use this period as a workshop, working on their projects, with demonstrations and judging as part of the session. A community club may use the time for sharing what has been learned in various project areas of the members. Add variety to club meetings by including demonstrations, video, guest speakers, discussions, tours. Include record keeping in club meetings, by conducting an occasional record keeping/portfolio workshop or by setting aside time at meetings to update record books/portfolios

Recreation | Social Time

Take time for fun activities that give members and leaders opportunities to develop relationships with each other. Holiday and seasonal parities are also a fun opportunity for growth and interaction.

Refreshments

If refreshments are served make it a learning experience. Give guidance on how to select and serve nutritious, inexpensive, and attractive food. This is also an opportunity to teach manners and etiquette while having fun in group setting.

MOCK LEGISLATURE

Mock Legislature is an opportunity for youth across Utah to experience the role of Legislator. Partnering with

Representative Paul Ray and members of the Office of Legislative Research, Utah 4-H youth get the rare opportunity to present and debate current bills on the House Floor of the Utah State Capitol. Youth practice the entire Legislative Process by studying bills prior to the event, presenting the bill, presenting the bill in committee, and passing or rejecting the bill on the House Floor.

Contests & Camps



4-H GLOSSARY

4-H Member: A member of the 4-H Program 3rd-12th grade (8-18 years olds starting September 1 of the current school year). The youth can participate in camps, clubs, and contests. \$10 is the membership fee for joining 4-H.

4-H Club: A small unit of 4-H age youth that meet together at least 6 times a year, for an hour each. The club consists of two adult volunteers and five youth from three different families. Clubs can be project based (4-H Horse Club) or community based. This is the basic unit of 4-H and essential to delivering 4-H curriculum.

Ambassador: 7th-12th grade leadership program where youth apply and interview to participate. The purpose of the Box Elder County 4-H Ambassador Program is to:

- Promote positive youth development
- Learn, practice, and demonstrate leadership skills, social skills, and volunteerism
- Promote 4-H with potential members, parents, and the general public with in the county
- Sponsor a county leadership focused event
- Expand youth's individual social and professional networks

Assistant Club Leader: This adult volunteer helps the main club leader plan activities, manage youth, and make sure the 4-H club is run in university policy.

Volunteer Appreciation Night: Once a year the County office will put on a recognition night for 4-H members and volunteers who have had a successful year. Awards include:

Outstanding Leader

Inspiring Leader

Family, Club, Member, and Volunteer of the Year

Friend of Box Elder 4-H

4-H Alumni of the Year

Camp: This is typically a county-run event that opens youth to a door of more knowledge and training in project areas. They can be one or more days. County camps can be run by volunteers, County Staff, or other qualified individuals. Typically the 4-H youth will return home each day. There is also a cost associated with this type of activity.

Charter: In order to be listed, the club must fill out a charter form each year. A chartered club requires the following:

Adult leaders to be screened

At least 5 youth members

Youth from at least 3 families

Six club meetings per year

Officers

Service activity

Agree to follow USU and 4-H Policy

Cloverbud: A 4-H member grades k-2nd (5-7 years of age) There are smaller project areas and ideas that these youth can participate in. Cloverbuds are not eligible to participate in shooting sports, horse, or livestock programs. \$10 membership fee.

Club Leader: Provides volunteer leadership to the kids in a club. This person is responsible for the safety of all youth in their club and ensuring that there are hands-on learning opportunity for kids. They are also to inform 4-Hers and their families or 4-H goals, programs, policies, and opportunities. Must be registered on Zsuite, complete trainings, and pass a background check.

Community Service: Youth need opportunities to experience service in their community that allows them to give back to the community. Each club, camp, or activity should find some way to serve. If you have questions, feel free to contact your County office.

County Contest: A county-wide event with prizes and awards that give 4-Hers a chance to show off their skills they've learned. Contests vary year-to-year but could be contests like:

Favorite Foods Cooking Contest

Horse and Livestock Bowl

Public Speaking Contest

Demonstration: This part of a 4-H project is for any 4-H member to show, not tell, how to do something. They use visuals, create an end product, and typically last 15 minutes.

Enrollment year: The year that youth are signed up for 4-H. Their age for activities is based on the age they are on September 1 of that school year. Enrollment year goes from September 1 - August 31. \$10 fee to join membership is required each year. This fee covers event insurance.

Fair: The Box Elder County Fair typically takes place the last full week in August. At the County Fair, kids can show off their projects and earn ribbons and other prizes.

Fashion Revue: The goal of Fashion Revue is to develop an understanding of personal presentation in public situations with regard to clothing, accessories and grooming. Participants will construct a clothing item, model it, and speak to judges about what they have created. Typically this event is held at the County Fair

FCS: Family Consumer Science refers to project areas such as sewing, cooking, healthy lifestyle, mental health, consumer products, etc.

Index: A checking account that the Extension office can set up for a club to hold money in.

Junior Teen Council: This introductory County Leadership Program is for 5th and 6th grade 4-H Members. Junior Teen Council members will expand themselves socially as they learn to plan and direct County Programming. The Box Elder County Junior Teen Council is in charge of

- The County Cloverbud Camp
- Judging Cloverbud Exhibits at Fair

Box Elder Junior Livestock (BEJL) Committee: In Box Elder County, the Junior Livestock Committee is made up of FFA and 4-H leaders, parents, and other invested individuals. They are considered a separate entity from Extension and make decisions based on all livestock exhibitors at the Fair. This committee is responsible for livestock tags, the livestock show, and exhibitor checks.

Motto: The 4-H motto is "To make the best better." We are always striving for improvement in everything we do.

National 4-H Week: Typically this week takes place the first full week in October. It's a week to celebrate all the success of 4-H clubs, praise youth, and build awareness for the great programs in our County.

Pledge: At the beginning of each 4-H meeting, leaders and youth should repeat the 4-H pledge:

I pledge my head to clearer thinking,

My heart to greater loyalty, My hands to larger service,

And my health to better living. For my club, my community, my country, and my world.



4-H GLOSSARY

Portfolio: The portfolio is used throughout State and County events as a resume and summary sheet of what the 4-Her has accomplished in that project area or enrollment year. There is a County portfolio contest and a state contests. The portfolio helps kids learn record keeping as well as prepare them for job interviews and scholarship applications.

Project: A 4-H Project should ideally contain these 4 components:

1. Learning experiences that take place in six or more sessions.
2. Community Service
3. Leadership
4. Exhibition of project

Project Leader: In a club, one adult might be responsible for helping youth in a particular area. For instance, a community club could have a club leader and then a project leader that helps with sewing, another one that works with geology, another with livestock, etc.

STEAM: Stands for Science Technology Engineering Art and Math (previously known as STEM).

Teen Council: A 4-H Teen Council is a group of teen 4-H members who work cooperatively with the County Extension Staff in planning and implementing 4-H Events in their area. Group of teens in grades 7-12 work, plan, and play together to strengthen their own personal leadership, communication, and teamwork skills while mentoring and teaching younger youth.

Zsuite: The website used for event and club registration. To participate in any 4-H sponsored activity, a child must sign up online. Volunteers must also register and pass applicable background checks.
