

Box Elder County 4-H Horse Program
New Member Packet
2021-2022

We are so excited to welcome you to Box Elder County Horse 4-H. It is an amazing opportunity for your whole family to gain knowledge, friends, have service opportunities, and be involved in the community. It is a volunteer-based program and we will need your help to keep it running! 4-H is a national non-profit youth development program that focuses on education as its primary goal.

The 4-H Pledge (recited at every practice, event, and show):

I pledge my Head to clearer thinking,
My Heart to greater loyalty,
My Hands to larger service,
and my Health to better living,

For my Club, My Community, My Country, and my World.

In order to be part of our county program, there are a few things you must do: You must enroll your child as a participant in Box Elder County 4-H, enroll in and pay the Western Horse Program fee (this is under events), and then enroll yourself and/or your spouse as a 4-H volunteer. All parents need to help volunteer, and all types and levels of knowledge are welcome. This also allows you and your child to begin participating in all activities immediately. While enrolling, you will notice there are 3 age groups: Junior, Intermediate, and Senior. It is based on the grade/age of your child as of September 1 of the current school year (2021-2022).

JUNIOR 3rd-5th grade

INTERMEDIATE 6th - 8th grade

SENIOR 9th-12th grade

The novice group, which any age member can be a part of, is a great way to get started in our horse shows. This group is for beginners and will have easier judging and less competitive grouping. This is not required to compete, but we recommend it for beginners. However, 4-H members can move up to the regular classes when they feel ready. The novice group is also not eligible for Region or State Horse Show Competitions.

Once you have enrolled and contacted a club in your area, you are now ready to join the fun!

First, to ensure that you are receiving Horse Program emails, make sure that you have selected the Horse/Pony project in your Zsuite profile. This selection is available just after you select a club(s). If you are still not receiving emails from marci.borg@usu.edu, send her an email and let her know! Be aware, all emails are sent to the address provided in your 4h.zsuite.org member profile.

Utah 4-H has a Helmet Policy: anytime you are on a Horse at a 4-H Sponsored event, including 4-H club practices, you are required to have a helmet on.

B.E County Horse Program is based out of the B.E County Fairgrounds. All county events will be held there unless otherwise stated. Events are held on Tuesday as this is the day the County has granted 4-H the use of the facility for free.

B.E County Events:

Winter Riding: Starts the 2nd Tuesday in January. These are organized ride nights that anyone in the Western Riding program can come to. They are scheduled for the 2nd and 4th Tuesday running January- April. Warm-up is from 4-5 pm with organized leader lessons from 5-7. These are led by the Horse Ambassadors and supervised by the Horse council.

In May the 2nd and 4th Tuesdays are used as practice horse shows.

Horse Education Nights: These are held on the 1st Tuesday of every month starting in January. These are where we get together without our horses to learn about different equine subjects, perform service, study, and prepare for the horse shows and horse contests. These are so important to the overall knowledge for our participants and their families as well as help build a strong county in Horse 4-H. We encourage you to attend them if at all possible.

Horse Camp: This is generally held the Friday and Saturday that school gets out for the summer. Friday is education, fun, crafts, and speakers-NO HORSES. Saturday is a full day of Horse clinics. This is held at the Bear River City Park. You must register for this separately and pay an additional fee to attend.

County Horse Shows:

For those participating in the western show program, we will have 3 horse shows throughout the summer that you may compete in. Each show you must be registered, have your horses up-to-date on all vaccines (biosecurity policy posted on our county website), and pay \$10 per show to help with costs (register on z-suites). These show events close the Friday before the show and no late entries will be accepted. The dress code for Box Elder County Horse judged events are long sleeved White Shirt with collar and buttons or snaps down the front, Dark Jeans, a western belt, western boots, and the 4-H Patch on the left sleeve. The dress code for speed events is the same except the belt is optional and the long sleeve white shirt can be replaced with a short or long sleeved T-Shirt or western shirt if desired. At the first show, you will be issued a constant number. You will need to keep this number and use it every show.

There are 7 events at each show.

The first event is a test, which is REQUIRED in order to compete in any event. It is online and specific to each age group. The test links are emailed out the Friday before the Show and close Monday at 5:00. No late tests are accepted. There are two educational books and the rule book that each participant will be encouraged to study. You can download the volumes or purchase a

hard copy of the Horse Study material at the Box Elder Extension office for \$15.00 a Volume. Links for these volumes can be found [Here](#)

The second event is with your horse, called Fitting and Showmanship. It is REQUIRED, and a judged event, where an unmounted participant and their horse perform a simple pattern at a walk or a trot, usually with elements like backup, pivot, and stand squared for inspection. The horse is unsaddled, groomed and cleaned well. No spurs may be worn. Check out the 4-H State rule book for more information.

The third event is Western Rail Work. This is a mounted, judged event, where the participant demonstrates different maneuvers in a class, like a walk, trot, canter, stop, and backup. It is completed on the rail.

The 4th event changes every two years. This year it will be Bareback Rail Work. This is very similar to Western Rail Work, only they will not have a saddle. All age groups will be asked to walk, trot, and canter on the rail as well as stop and backup. Any participant not confident or safe will be encouraged to come to the center of the arena during the Loping. Not loping is an automatic White ribbon in our county. Hanging onto the mane is a ribbon drop.

At the state and region level, not loping is an automatic DQ because it is considered a "broken pattern" for not following the class maneuvers assigned by the judge. Each judged class, each participant will be given a Blue, Red, or White Ribbon Placement. But remember, as 4-H is primarily an education program, we want to encourage everyone to try difficult things but safety is our main concern. Check out the 4-H State rule book for more information. Upon completion of these four events, participants are allowed to change out of their white button-down shirt and wear any t-shirt, sweatshirt, or colored western shirt to compete in the following three events. The 4-H patch, boots, jeans, and helmet are still required.

The last three events are considered speed events and are scored based on how much time it takes to complete them. That doesn't mean your child and horse must go fast. We encourage all to pick the speed they can safely complete the event.

The 5th event is pole bending. The horse will complete a pattern of 6 poles, weaving through and around them, and cross the finish timer. Each rider will compete individually, alone, for this event. If the pattern is broken, the rider is disqualified. If a pole is knocked over, 5 seconds is added.

The 6th event changes every two years on rotation with bareback. This year we are competing in Scurry. It is an event with 6 small 16" jumps and a barrel. If the pattern is broken, the rider is disqualified. If a jump is knocked over, 5 seconds is added.

The 7th event is barrel racing. There are 3 barrels in which the horse must run around, in a specific pattern, without breaking the pattern or knocking over a barrel (5 seconds added).

At the 3rd show of the year, a 4-H portfolio is required to be submitted. The 4-H portfolio is required to be on the Box Elder County Region and State Team. A Blue Ribbon quality must be submitted or you will have it returned to you. You will have a couple of days to fix it and then resubmit. 4-H portfolios are submitted in Zsuite under events.

Region Horse Shows

Box Elder County is fortunate enough to be able to compete against other counties in a Team Horse Show. The horse show events are the same events as our county horse shows, but they are scored as a team. The Box Elder Region team is determined by the overall placings at the county shows. The top 8 in each age group will form the region team.

State Horse Shows

The state horse show is like our county shows except top youth from across the state are competing in the show. Participation is by qualifications only so the Top 5-7 in each age group are chosen to represent our county at the state horse show.

Horseless Classics Contests

Box Elder County 4-H also participates in Horseless Team and Individual Contests throughout the year. Having access to a horse is not required for participation in these contests. The Horseless Contests are now available for all age groups to participate in and we encourage all youth to get involved in some or all.

Horse Bowl Contest consists of teams of 4 or 5 participants, competing against their age group. They will study and answer questions as a team about basic horse knowledge and can compete on a county, state, or even national level.

Hippology Contest can be entered as an individual or as a 4 man team event, competing against their age group in 4 different areas; Examination, Station Phase, Judging Phase, and Team Problems. This is a unique and fun way to make friends and compete in equine understanding and husbandry.

Horse Judging Contest is an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4H horse projects to demonstrate deductive reasoning and public speaking skills as they evaluate quality horses and explain their decisions. This is open to all age groups, and teams compete in groups of 3 or 4 or youth can compete individually.

Horse Demonstrations is a competition we hold on the county level. Each participant is encouraged to prepare a timed demonstration, teaching a judge about an aspect of horsemanship that they are interested in. They can use powerpoint, objects, videos, etc. to teach their topic. These are judged and prizes are awarded on the county level. Presentations can be done as an individual event or as a team of 2.

Horse Public Speaking Contest, which is similar to demonstrations except objects and demonstration tools are not allowed. This is an individual only contest.
