Epsilon Sigma Phi is the National Honorary Extension Fraternity. It began in January 1927 in Boseman, Montana. Utah's Iota Chapter held its first meeting on May 9, 1927 at the Eccles Hotel in Logan, Utah. The first initiation ceremony with six candidates was held July 1927.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Epsilon Sigma Phi is to maintain the standards and ideals, uphold the morale, prestige and respect of the Cooperative Extension Service; to develop an effective working relationship and a spirit of fraternal fellowship among the present and former Extension employees, and to promote professionalism within the Extension Service.

THE EMBLEM

The official emblem of Epsilon Sigma Phi has a wall of Troy around the outside symbolizing the protection which the fraternity gives to its members. The E on the stem of the key signifies Extension. The Greek letters are interpreted to mean Extension Service Veteran.

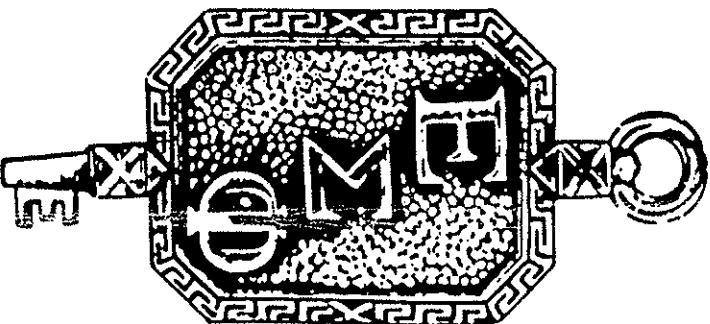
I BELIEVE in intellectual freedom to search for and present the truth without bias and with courteous tolerance toward the view of others.
