2023 IMPACTS

THE EXPANDED FOOD AND NUTRITION EDUCATION PROGRAM (EFNEP)

In 2023 EFNEP, Utah reached 498 adults and 2497 youth directly and 1180 family members indirectly.

EFNEP ADULTS

Defining the problem: Obesity, poor nutrition, and limited physical activity are significant health concerns. Poor health disproportionately affects minority and low-income populations. Educational opportunities and resources are limited.

Investing in the Solution; EFNEP brings together federal, state, and local resources to target two primary audiences: Low-income families with young children and low-income youth. The program operates in all counties across Utah.



REACHING LOW-INCOME FAMILIES

69% of FNEP participants who reported income are at or below 100% of poverty, earning \$30,000 a year for a family of four.

REACHING DIVERSE POPULATIONS

At least 39% of all EFNEP adults are minorities.

EFNEP YOUTH

We collect demographic data on all youth groups who participate in EFNEP. Youth participating in EFNEP gain nutrition knowledge, learn about the importance of eating a variety of foods, taught how to select healthy food and how to prepare food safely. Collaborating with school teachers, school administrators, and parents is a way to maximize the reach and impacts of nutrition education programs in schools.

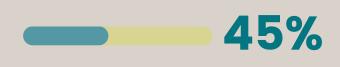

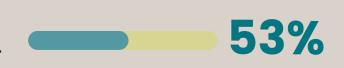
