Exploring Leadership

PLANNING & ORGANIZATION: INITIATIVE

Initiative can be difficult to identify and describe because those who possess it don't wait to be told it's time to act. Sometimes they are finished doing something before anyone else has recognized it needed to be done.

CONVERSATION STARTER:

After setting up environment explained in "Facilitation Tips" ask: "Did anyone notice it when you arrived? Isn't it interesting that you all noticed it, but no one corrected it?" Taking care of something without being asked is Initiative!

Often young people are timid about taking "charge of a situation" because they fear the judgement of their peers, but Initiative is a critical skill that will benefit young people and those they work with. In this lesson, participants will examine examples of Initiative and share some of their own.

KEY OBJECTIVES:

- Describe Initiative
- Share examples of Initiative

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- Enough quotations cut out ahead of time for each participant (Appendix)
- Time prior to teaching to set up environment as described in "Facilitation Tips" section

EXPLORATION ACTIVITY:

Initiative is about doing, but sometimes it can be hard to describe, so we're going to look at many different ways it has been described.

FACILITATION TIPS:

- Before the participants arrive, arrange something in the environment that requires someone to act on it.
- Possibilities: put some obtrusive (but not heavy) item in front of the door so that everyone who enters has to walk around it; place some litter in a very obvious place; move the desks/chairs; scatter supplies into an unusable mess.

- Give each participant a quote about Initiative.
- Have each participant read their quote aloud to the group. (If there aren't many people in the group, give each person more than one and go around the circle twice.)
- Ask these questions:
 - How does Initiative play into this group? Who in this group shows the most Initiative? Why?
 - Does everyone have Initiative built-in or is it a skill you develop?



REFLECTION QUESTIONS:

- Now that you've heard all these descriptions of Initiative, how do you know it when you see it?
- What are specific examples of initiative? (What does Initiative look, sound, or feel like?)
- What fears do we have to overcome in order to demonstrate Initiative?

APPLICATION DISCUSSION:

- What are some real life circumstances in which you might demonstrate Initiative?
- What are some strategies for getting started? (How do we overcome the fears?)
 - This is the rest of the quote by Mark Twain: "The secret of getting started is breaking your complex, overwhelming tasks into small manageable tasks, and then starting on the first one."



CONCLUSION:

Initiative is the ability to assess a situation and act independently. Those with Initiative do not have to be told to do something; they just do what needs to be done. Initiative is important because all the planning in the world isn't going to matter if someone doesn't put the plan into action. Bo Bennett said, "Without Initiative, leaders are simply workers in leadership positions." As young leaders, you must take the opportunity to exercise your Initiative; otherwise, you aren't really leading. Victor Hugo is attributed with this quote: "Initiative is doing the right without being told." Don't wait! Do what you know to be right!
